
Economy class airfare, taxes, surcharges and fees are included in the tour cost.



ACCOMMODATIONS

Accommodations will be at privately owned “casas particulares” which offer deluxe rooms with a/c, with private facilities, breakfast and meal services.

These private enterprises offer superior alternatives to state owned hotels which most of the time lack the amenities that they advertise and which are sanctioned by US Treasury Department.





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PROGRAM DETAILS

DAY 1

Sun, Nov 6 - Houston - Havana

We will depart Houston for Havana.

Upon arrival, we will be welcomed by our guide and driver. Then we will be transferred to our accommodations.

Rest of the day at leisure.

In the evening, welcome dinner at a local “paladar.”

Overnight in Havana

Meals: B-D

Havana is the capital and largest city of Cuba. Havana is the country's main port and leading commercial center. The city has a population of 2.1 million inhabitants.

The city of Havana was founded by the Spanish in the 16th century, it served as a springboard for the Spanish conquest of the Americas becoming a stopping point for Spanish galleons returning to Spain. Philip II of Spain granted Havana the title of capital in 1592. Walls as well as forts were built to protect the city.

The sinking of the U.S. battleship Maine in Havana's harbor in 1898 was the immediate cause of the Spanish–American War.

Contemporary Havana can essentially be described as three cities in one: Old Havana, Vedado and the newer suburban districts.

In Cuba a **Paladar** is a family-run restaurant. The name comes from a Spanish word for "palate." Paladares serve as a counterpart to state-run restaurants for tourists seeking a more vivid interaction with Cuban reality, and looking for homemade Cuban food.



DAY 2

Mon, Nov 7 - Old Havana

Our full day in Old Havana:

We will walk through the historic center, with its exceptional architecture, visit the used booksellers market, Hotel Ambos Mundos which was Ernest Hemingway's first home in Havana, see various private enterprises to engage with Cuba's growing private sector.

We will meet with staff at Clandestina, Cuba's first online clothing retailer and renowned design shop.

After lunch we will visit an artist's private studio and step into Cuba's world of dance with a private demonstration and lesson.

In the evening dinner at a local paladar.

Overnight in Havana

Meals: B-L-D

La Habana Vieja (Old Havana), declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1982, is the historic center of the city of Havana. It is formed by a harbor and the official center, the Plaza de Armas. There you will find all kinds of picturesque monuments, fortresses, churches, palaces, etc. It is full of authentic architectural treasures from different periods and offers one of the most comprehensive collections of urban buildings in all America. This area of the city alone is home to more than a thousand buildings of historical importance with various examples of distinguished architecture ranging from Baroque to Art Deco.



DAY 3

Tue, Nov 8 - Cojimar & Lawton - Havana

In the morning, we will travel to Cojimar, the local fishing village that was the setting for Hemingway's *The Old Man and the Sea*.

We will participate in a traditional Cuban cooking experience, from gathering ingredients from a local organic garden to putting them in use in the kitchen (and bar.)

Then we will visit an inspiring community project, such as Muraleando.

After stopping at the independent Artisan's Market, we will walk through Havana's grand San Rafael Boulevard and visit with private business owners.

Tonight we will enjoy a show at the famous Tropicana club.

Overnight in Havana

Meals: B-L-D

Cojimar is a small fishing town located seven kilometers to the east of Havana. This town is famous for being the setting of Hemingway's most famous novel: "The Old Man and the Sea," which allowed him to be awarded the Nobel Prize for literature in 1954. In the novel, the Old Man docked the boat "El Pilar" here during the 40s and 50s. This town was established in the 17th century in the mouth of the river of same name. In 1762, it was here where the British army landed in its conquest of Havana.

Created in 2001 by the artist Manuel Diaz Baldrich, **Muraleando** has transformed the neighborhood into an art gallery. Children from the community and visitors to the project attend classes in pottery, painting, music, dance and engraving aimed at building and developing their artistic skills. This a singular cultural experience and a unique look into Cuban culture, art, food and its way of life.



DAY 4

Wed, Nov 9 - Excursion to Las Terrazas

Today we will have a full day trip to the Las Terrazas. In our trip, we will visit the community, coffee shop, coffee ruins and enjoy a traditional lunch.

After returning to Havana, we will visit the famous community mosaic project known as “Fusterlandia.”

Overnight in Havana

Meals: B-L-D

The **Las Terrazas** project arose at the end of the sixties with the purpose of recovering an area that had been destroyed by the intensive cultivation of coffee in the 19th century, so much so that, in an area of 5000 hectares, millions of trees were planted, terraces were dug for cultivation and a small town was built following guidelines that respect nature.

Although the interesting ruins of the old coffee plantations can still be seen here and there, their coffee past is today history, as this environment has been reborn as a natural paradise



DAY 5

Thu, Nov 10 - Day in Havana

This morning, after stopping by a local farmer's market, we will visit Callejon de Hamel, the wonderful alley entirely devoted to Afro-Cuban culture from street art to sculpture to music.

After lunch, we will experience the future of Cuban acrobatics with the children's community project Angeles del Futuro.

Then comes the time we take a ride in classic American convertible cars for a tour of picturesque Havana.
