The World Affairs Council of Greater Houston is a member of the World Affairs Councils of America, a national organization with chapters in more than 95 U.S. cities. The Council in Houston has provided programs since 1969, first as the Gulf Coast World Affairs Council, and then in its current role as the World Affairs Council of Greater Houston, reaching communities in the Greater Houston metropolitan area. Today the Council has over 7,000 active members, making us one of the largest and most successful Councils and public forums in the nation.

Councils were first established in the U.S. at the end of World War I as a result of America's increased international responsibilities. It became critical for our citizenry to be better informed about world affairs through participation in local lectures and discussions. The importance of this mission became more apparent after World War II, and yet again after the Cold War. Councils around the U.S., including ours, continue to grow and serve their communities.

As a Council, the importance and relevance of our mission is apparent on a daily basis. We have consequences for the world at large, such as influencing decisions made by politicians, business leaders or the general electorate, which affect generations to come.

Education

About

The Education Department's collaborative approach, in working directly with schools, community colleges, universities, and education partners, organizes close to 75 international education events that impact 7,000+ students and 1,200+ teachers each year. While some educator workshops have a small fee, all events are free to students.

Goals

1. Connect students to global leaders of our time, and provide them the opportunity to become culturally sensitive, globally competent citizens. While many of the diverse Houston-area student populations are underserved, our mission is to give all students the chance to explore their role in our increasingly globalized world.
2. Offer educators personal and professional development opportunities through workshops and international travel. We believe educators shape our future leaders, and it is our mission to equip them with the knowledge, experience, and resources necessary to empower Houston-area youth and prepare them for our diverse and interconnected world.

Teacher Programs

Global Perspectives Workshops for Educators

Global Perspectives Workshops aim to enrich student learning by providing educators with classroom-ready information on the economic, political, and cultural issues of a given country. Each workshop includes TEKS-aligned lesson plans, instructional resources, and lectures by leading experts. Workshop content and curriculum are designed for educators at the middle school through college levels.

International Travel for Educators

The Council offers one international study tour for select teachers each year. The itinerary includes visits to schools and hospitals, briefings at USAID or the US embassy, and meetings with journalists or community leaders. These tours offer local educators the opportunity to obtain firsthand knowledge of important global topics to bring back to their classrooms. Our 2016 Study Tour was to Vietnam & Cambodia.



Student Programs

Academic WorldQuest

Academic WorldQuest is a trivia contest focusing on international topics. In this World Affairs Council tradition, high school teams play in four rounds of 20 questions for a chance to represent Houston and compete at the national level in Washington D.C.

International Careers Expo

Featuring keynote speaker Hans Stockton from the University of St. Thomas and booths representing various global companies, International Careers Expo was a unique opportunity for high school students to explore potential careers prior to entering college and/or the workforce. It was a great opportunity to learn from people currently or previously in the workforce about the many career options available in international affairs. Students had the chance to hear from professionals in the oil and gas sector, finance, law, diplomacy, medicine and more.

Local-to-Global Politics: Understanding Refugees & Immigrants through the Political Process

Local-to-Global Politics launched in 2015 as the Council's first political campaign "bootcamp" for students. Designed to expose, engage, and empower students to be active participants in their communities, Local-to-Global Politics gives students the opportunity to hear from informed speakers, participate in engaging activities and gain a deeper understanding of the political process. This year's topic was "Understanding Refugees & Immigrants through the Political Process."

Foreign Language Luncheon

What used to be seven separate foreign language luncheons is now one large event for nearly 1,000 students, teachers and local professionals. The luncheon was a great way to motivate students and applaud their efforts in language acquisition by offering a place for them to demonstrate their foreign language skills through conversation with peers, local professionals, and more.

World Cultures Summit

This exciting and interactive three-hour event brought world cultures alive for middle school students. They had international adventures, visiting exhibit booths and traveling "Around the World in 60 minutes" through a fact-finding scavenger hunt. A dance or musical performance and themed snacks were also included. The 2016 region of study was the Middle East.



Travel

The World Affairs Council travel department was founded on the tradition of intellectual exploration at our mission's core. The Council's travel program offers international travel that is not only memorable and educational, but highly affordable as well. We choose locations for their geopolitical interest, exploring critical regions during times of change. Working with Houston's diplomatic corps allows us to arrange in-country briefings and extraordinary people-to-people exchanges. Pre and post-trip briefings supplement memorable experiences with relevant information and give our travelers time to connect with one another. Most trips also include an embassy visit or visits to other vital centers of cultural and political life.


